It was a perfect day at Sponne to host the Y3/4 & Y5/6 cross country competition!


We had over 150 primary school students and 50 Sports Leaders, managing teams, running as hare and tortoises, organising start line, finish line and results -



# Bah Humbug! - It's Christmas!



A review of Charles Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol' Performed by the Royal Shakespeare Company.

Dickens' classic was written over 150 years ago, but the themes exposed remain as relevant now as they were then: growing poverty, an increasing divide between the haves and have nots, and social injustice. But it's not all 'Bah humbug', it's Christmas after all! Edgar's marvellous production sees a 'clutching, covetous, old transformed into a philanthropic and altruistic individual. The version of the popular classic follows the sell out success of 2017 and 2018 by the Royal Shakespeare Company and it does not disappoint. No longer a 'young one', Ade Edmond's effortless performance wows viewers with his flawless, witty and highly entertaining portrayal of Scrooge.

Dickens' gripping novella attention to the plight of the poor and convinced readers that if society remains ignorant and oblivious to the harsh realities of the life of the lower class, then one will only result in a life misery. While the ghost Christmas present is usually illustrated and acted as a male character, the original text actually refers to all the "spirits" who visit Scrooge with the gender-neutral pronoun "it". David Edgar explores this magnificently through the tweaks of portrayal of the ghosts as females, with Sunetra Sarker and Rebecca Lacey offering their creative takes on the characters. It's a smart device that brings a new dimension to contemporary audience.

The costumes were beguiling. My personal favourite was the ghost of Christmas present as it perfectly entwines Dickens' description of 'a jolly giant in one simple green robe'.

To conclude, I would very much recommend it to anyone who enjoys a well-produced, witty, whilst also traditional fable in the theatre located in the medieval market town of Stratford Upon Avon. And you don't have to be called Carol(e) to enjoy it!



# The Secrets of the Garden

In English this term our students have just finished studying The Secret Garden by Frances Hodgson Burnett. Here is just one of the many wonderful reviews of the novel written by our students.

This heart-wrenching story follows sour little Mary as she is sent to Yorkshire and meets a spoiled little boy who had been locked away his whole life. While exploring the land, she hears of a garden that is hidden from the world and sets off hoping to find it. The challenges she meets and the friends she makes show what opening your heart to hope can do.

This bildungsroman novel holds many mysteries that stir beneath the normal seeming disguise that Misselthaite Manor wears. It shows how hard it can be to be left alone with mental health issues but it also reveals how a little bit of love can help to heal your mind. The pure friendships shine through all of the challenging moments the characters face and prove that friends are key to fixing your heart.

There was only one thing that I think could end up being a major con for quite a lot of people, but it is worth remembering that this book was written a long time ago, when attitudes were very different. At the time that it was written, many people, including Burnett the author, believed that most illnesses were only in the mind. Nowadays, people have a better understanding of mental and hidden illnesses. I think that some people may find the fact that this opinion is in the book quite offensive.

It has quite a few pros such as: it really shows how people change people; the way it is written is very immersive; and it is amazing at playing with your emotions in a way that can make you burst out laughing or cry with relief.

Three children become the perfect people for each other: the girl who always wore "a sour expression", the boy who only ever had "Hysterics-Hysterics", the boy who "was like an angel" and the garden that had been locked and hidden from society for ten years.

I would definitely recommend this to anybody who wants a fantastic book that will immerse you fully into its story

## **PSHE News - Wasted Tour**

Students in Year 8 recently saw a performance by students from Northampton College. The play, 'Wasted', tells the story of Charlotte who is reflecting on becoming dependent on drugs after the death of her grandmother, whilst she is recovering with the help of an NGAGE support worker.

This play supports our PSHE curriculum and in particular the current Year 8 unit of drugs, exploring issues with inhalants, nitrous oxide and edibles; and a unit later in the year which explores healthy lifestyles.

The students were enthralled by the performance and then enthusiastically got involved with the Q&A session afterwards. Feedback from both parents and students was very positive with students quoting:

"Very helpful and a clear story that I could understand. It showed me what to do if me or one of my friends was in trouble." TW

"It was a fantastic performance and I really understood the clear message that they performed to us" PD-P

"It was very good and it really showed how anyone could take drugs for any reason but also where to get help from." KF

"shows the reality of loss in a way most shows or books don't" MG

"Drugs don't fix your problems, you have to face them." SA

"Nothing's ever so broken that it can't be fixed." MR

"The actors all brought the story to life and helped the audience see how anyone can be involved with drugs and where to find help and support." OL

"The wasted performance was a great experience. It taught us about how easy it is to get into alcohol and drugs. The grief that Charlotte is feeling is from a very relatable cause: the death of her Grandmother. Overall, I am very glad to have had this experience." CC

Parents reported that nearly 60% of their children spoke to them about the performance without being asked and that over 80% were able to recount details of the story; a third of them being able to do so in great detail.


