## **British Science Week**

After an enforced hiatus last year, British Science Week (BSW) returned this month and as restrictions have eased, we have been able to provide a whole gamut of BSW activities.


The in-class 'unusual practical' sessions saw our students turning base metals into gold (well, ok, perhaps not quite, but a lot of copper coins went home plated in brass!), whilst others made disappearing worms from a special polymer that is often used in foodstuffs, others made ice cream, whilst some students developed and investigated invisible writing techniques, something which those who attend Science club excelled at, having already completed a variety of investigations earlier in the year.

The Key Stage 3 poster competition, coordinated by Mr Fleming, produced some outstanding work from many students. This year's theme was "Growth", and any topic related to growth was a suitable one for a poster. Consequently, we had students presenting work on topics ranging from tadpoles and babies to technology growth and the development of the car. Prizes were awarded both within each class and for Y7 and Y8 overall, and there were runners-up and merit prizes aplenty. Winners' subjects were equally diverse, with topics from the lifecycle of the butterfly to growing plants in outer space.



Finally, and often considered the highlight of our BSW celebration, was the Science assembly. This year our theme was 'Rates of Reaction', to acknowledge the speed with which scientists around the world responded to the COVID-19 pandemic. Although the

pandemic isn't over, we took this opportunity to celebrate the tremendous scientific efforts of the last two years and celebrate that we have reached a stage in the UK, where life is beginning to feel more normal again. Led by Mrs Halling with help from Mr Woods and our superb

## Focus on DT - Let's get Organised...


Year 7 students have been learning to use the tools and equipment in our DT workshops.

## Flour Babies

Our Year 10 Childcare class were tasked with making and looking after their own flour babies for two weeks as part of a new project. Working in pairs, the students created a profile for their flour baby (with some very eccentric names) and made a schedule between themselves, making sure their baby was not left unattended during the two weeks.

Students were to ensure they received five signatures every day from family or staff (or shop workers in some cases) otherwise Miss Ebbiary of Sponne Social Services would have to intervene! Students also kept a log of their daily activities with their babies, with some attending football practice, some going shopping at the local Co-op and others had wholesome infant experiences such as gaming, watching Netflix and eating chips!

The project culminated in a final presentation with all students presenting their flour baby journey whilst referring to stages of development they feel their baby would have gone through had it been a real baby.

With students sitting their BTEC exam this Summer, this was the perfect opportunity for students to be reflective on the developmental stages of real infants. The flour babies have not yet made the natural transition to delicious cupcakes but we are so pleased that this project managed to involve students, teachers, parents and the community alike.

With the pandemic bringing about its own challenges over the past few years, it's always important to remember the small things we're grateful for.




## **Business Games**

## Eliza Fundraising



My name is Eliza Dickson-Lewis, I am 13 years old and I am in 8SDB. I am one of the youngest of the 36 young people from Northamptonshire Scouts who have been selected to attend the World Scout Jamboree that will be held in South Korea in summer 2023.



I attend the 1st Byfield Scout group and I need to raise £4000 to pay for this amazing adventure. One of the things I am doing is collecting used print head ink cartridges. Ink cartridges are usually thrown away and end up in landfills, but they are not biodegradable and as a result have a significant impact on the environment. Used printhead ink cartridges contain all of the clever bits of a printer within the ink cartridge. They can be efficiently recycled and reused and by collecting them I can raise money towards my Jamboree trip.

I will leave a collection box in the school staff room for staff and another will be located in student services for any used cartridges to be deposited.

I am aware that 40,000 Scouts travelling across the globe to Korea will have a significant impact on the environment. Recycling is a good way to offset some of my carbon footprint for this trip, I also hope to buy and plant trees as a further part of compensating for the carbon dioxide released into the atmosphere during my flights there and back.



# **British Schools Karting Championship**

Following on from the Practice session back in February, Sponne went into the Local Finals full of optimism. The Local Final in Watford would see 6 Teams, consisting of three drivers, compete in 6 races, two for each driver. Points are awarded based on the race results, with the three teams with the most points, progressing forward to the Regional Finals in May.

The maths was simple. 3 Teams would go through, and for the other 3 Teams the journey would end here tonight. On average, each driver needed to finish third in each race to progress forward to the Regionals. The Sponne Team were confident as Mia took to the Wheel for the first race.





Of the three drivers, Mia, Guy and Monica, Mia had the worst draw. Her first race saw her start third on the grid. The circuit is tight, slippery and difficult to overtake, meaning the starting track position can have a big impact on your race. The race ebbed and flowed, with Mia making up positions, and then later falling back again. Mia fought well, to take the flag in third, meaning the first hurdle was cleared.

Next up was Guy, who would be starting in 2nd. The front three broke away, fighting all the way through nose to tail. Few opportunities were available for anyone to make a move, testing the nerves of many watching the race. Eventually, Guy managed to sneak past to take the lead, to only be pressed hard for the remainder of the race as he now had to defend. Good use of back markers gave some breathing space until the chequered flag, which provided much needed relief for the spectators.



For the final first round race, Monica had the benefit of starting on pole, close behind her in second, was James with whom Monica has raced with before. The start was a clean get away, with the front three breaking away again. James pushed Monica for the whole race, but wasn't able to force an error which would allow him to take the lead. As they came up the ramp, it was Monica who arrived first, and would hold the lead to the flag.

Going into the second half of the night Sponne were on a high. Two wins, and a third place, put them in the lead, and feeling comfortable. However, the second half was going to get tougher. There was little to separate the leaders, circling the track bumper to bumper. As they approached the end of the lap, it looked like the front pair tripped over each other as they jostled for position, with Mia close in to make the most of the situation. As they collided and blocked the track, the red flag came out to halt the race.

The Track Steward handed down an 8 second penalty to Mia, which seemed a little unjust at least from the vantage point from the Spectators gallery. This set Mia back at the race restart, but she got her head down to make up the deficit. Unfortunately, despite her good pace, there just weren't enough laps left for her to pull back the time, meaning she finished 5th.

Guy's second race saw him start at the back. It was a solid race from Guy, as he progressed up through the field. However, once you get near the front runners, the circuit is just too tight to offer many chances to overtake. Guy worked hard, finishing the race in 2nd, and a great result from the starting position.

Monica's final race, was the last of the night. She was starting in the middle of the pack, with James once again behind her. The first half of the race went well, with Monica making her way up to 2nd, with James close behind. They had caught up to the back of 1st place with Monica looking for a way to get past. A tactical error down the back straight trying to pass on the outside, left the door open on the inside for James to pass Monica, leaving Monica back in third.. This is how the race positions remained up to the final chequered flag.

All the Teams gathered round the podium as the results were called out. In 6th place..... well we weren't 6th, nor 5th. As the team that finished 4th was announced, our hearts were in our mouths, hoping it wasn't Sponne. IT WASN'T! We had made it! Third place went to Sponne School, with the top three Teams separated by only a few points.

This means Sponne will be progressing on to the Regional Finals on 11th May in Reading and a chance for the Team to get through to the National Finals!

Great to see the Sponne Team on the podium, bringing a bit of balance and diversity to the top three steps. Bring on the Regional Finals.


