






Fundamental British Values in Religious Education

<p>Individual liberty</p> 	<p>Students learn about the vast diversity of beliefs and worldviews in modern Britain, as well as the basis of the belief that humans are endowed with free will. Students are free to express their views on religions in a respectful way regardless of their own beliefs, this is a key component for all lessons and in philosophy club.</p>
<p>Mutual Respect</p> 	<p>Students are regularly involved in discussion and debates, and learn to listen respectfully to alternative viewpoints. By learning more about the religions followed by people in Britain students are able to show greater understanding and respect of different viewpoints on topics such as abortion and the rights of animals</p>
<p>Democracy</p> 	<p>The innate value of every human is explored during Judaism and Christianity modules, with an emphasis on the need for everyone's voice to be heard in our society. By exploring the rules within religions students are able to make the links between beliefs and actions which are important in a democratic society.</p>
<p>Freedom of faiths and beliefs</p> 	<p>Students learn about the major world religions, as well as several other worldviews, with specific reference to how these are practised in modern Britain, and their protection in British law. In A Level Philosophy lessons students learn about ethical theories which can impact on the actions of people within society and apply these to different scenarios to understand how they work in practice.</p>
<p>The rule of law</p> 	<p>Students learn about the importance of the rule of law in Philosophy and Ethics modules, and explore what the alternative might look like; with an emphasis upon the need for law and order in a functioning society.</p>
